



# DRUGS & ALCOHOL IN EAST BELFAST

Responding to the *New Normal* - A Guide to Support Services

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# **INTRODUCTION & OVERVIEW**

In February and March 2017, twenty five groups in East Belfast took part in a community conversation regarding drug and alcohol use in their neighbourhoods and the challenges that face their communities as a result of it. East Belfast Community Development Agency (EBCDA) and East Belfast Drug and Alcohol Stakeholder Forum (with support from East Belfast District Policing and Community Safety Partnership), organised this series of community conversation events, which consisted of 10 workshops and an online survey, to establish what the "new normal" is for these neighbourhoods. The conversation events provided the participants with an opportunity to share their experiences and collectively explore strategies and resources that can be harnessed to address the challenges that face them within their own neighbourhoods.

# OUTCOMES

The 'New Normal' process had the following outcomes:

- Develop a greater understanding of current trends in drugs and alcohol use;
  - Highlight the correlation between alcohol/drug use and criminal and anti-social behaviour.
- Develop a greater community confidence and representation at Drug and Alcohol Stakeholder Forum.

The main recommendations arising from the workshops are also summarised overleaf.

# THE FORUM AND GROUPS INVOLVED

EBCDA is an umbrella body for community groups in East Belfast. It's job is to add value to the activity undertaken by groups in local areas and to work with key organisations to ensure the continued development of a community sector in East Belfast that is recognised, valued and effective. EBCDA seeks to support successful community development, encourage reflective practice and promote cooperation and locally based solutions.


East Belfast Drug and Alcohol Stakeholder Forum came into existence in 2013 as a response to local concern about the impact of drugs and alcohol, and awareness of support services. It is a multi-agency forum facilitated by EBCDA and is attended by community groups, voluntary agencies, service providers and statutory organisations with an interest in drug and alcoholrelated issues. 
